In title LX, add at the end the following:

1	SEC. 6013. SENSE OF CONGRESS ON THE USE OF THE DE-
2	FENSE PRODUCTION ACT OF 1950 FOR GLOB-
3	AL VACCINE PRODUCTION.
4	(a) FINDINGS.—The Congress finds the following:
5	(1) As President Biden has stated, "We know
6	America will never be fully safe until the pandemic
7	that is raging globally is under control. No ocean is
8	wide enough, no wall is high enough to keep us
9	safe.".
10	(2) More than 600,000 Americans have already
11	died from COVID-19. Already, more Americans have
12	died from COVID-19 than from World War I, World
13	War II, the Vietnam War, and 9/11 combined. The
14	continued replication of SARS-CoV-2 abroad in-
15	creases the likelihood of a harmful mutation that
16	renders current vaccines ineffective. A new variant
17	could be more transmissible and cause more severe
18	disease, posing a higher risk to the millions of Amer-

1 icans who have not been vaccinated, like the Delta 2 variant. (3) Approximately 11 billion doses are needed 3 to vaccinate the world's population, but to date, the 5 US government has donated just 40 million doses. 6 More recent promises by the G7 would only deliver 7 an additional one billion doses by the end of 2022. 8 (4) Sharing manufacturing know-how and ex-9 pertise is critical to quickly ramping up production. 10 Expanding the world's manufacturing capacity is 11 critical because donations and bilateral agreements 12 to increase vaccine doses in low- and middle-income 13 countries cannot quickly meet the global demand. 14 The U.S. Government, as the largest (5)15 coronavirus research and development funder in the world, is uniquely positioned to push companies to 16 17 share the knowledge required to end the pandemic. 18 (6) Manufacturers around the world have af-19 firmed that they can help ramp up production if 20 they have access to technology. According to the 21 World Health Organization, 19 manufacturers from 22 more than a dozen countries in Africa, Asia, and 23 Latin America have expressed interest in ramping 24 up mRNA vaccine production. The Biden adminis-

tration has also urged companies to share tech-

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1	nology. But vaccine originator corporations have
2	been reluctant to share technology.
3	(7) The Defense Production Act of 1950 pro-
4	vides the President with broad authority to support
5	the nation's defense. The Defense Production Act of
6	1950's definition of "national defense" includes
7	"military or critical infrastructure assistance to any
8	foreign nation".
9	(8) The Defense Production Act of 1950 em-
10	powers the President to directly "allocate materials,
11	services, and facilities" to promote national defense
12	needs. The Act defines "materials" to include "any
13	technical information or services ancillary to the use
14	of any such materials".
15	(9) The Defense Production Act of 1950 has
16	been used repeatedly to prioritize contracts and or-
17	ders from U.S. companies to foreign nations.
18	(b) Sense of Congress.—It is the sense of Con-
19	gress that the President should make full use of the Presi-
20	dent's authority under the Defense Production Act of
21	1950 to scale vaccine production and deployment globally,
22	which will save millions of lives and protect Americans
23	from the risk of emerging viral threats.
